#### ***Do You Need Money for College? Renamed Federal Student Aid at a Glance***

Based on customer feedback from usability studies and focus groups, we will no longer print *Do You Need Money for College? (subtitled Federal Student Aid at a Glance)*. We will, however, continue to provide it in PDF form—under the title *Federal Student Aid at a Glance*—on the [StudentAid.gov/resources](http://StudentAid.gov/resources) page.

#### ***Funding Your Education Renamed Do You Need Money for College?***

We will continue to print *Funding Your Education* in the new colorful, six-page format, which students and parents have indicated they find easy to read and appealing. However, starting with the version being printed this fall, *Funding Your Education* will be renamed *Do You Need Money for College?* (a name preferred by students and parents).

### **Additional Student Loan Publications Now in Print**

Federal Student Aid is continuing to update our publication portfolio, adding to the series of short publications about federal student loans. The series covers the student loan life cycle (from loan basics through repayment):

- *Federal Student Loans: Basics for Students* (now available to order)
- *Federal Student Loans: Direct PLUS Loan Basics for Parents* (now available to order)
- *Federal Student Loans: Be a Responsible Borrower* (now available to order)

- *Federal Student Loans: Loan Forgiveness Options* (available to order in 2016)

### **Paper FAFSA<sup>®</sup> Forms Discontinued Starting in 2017–18**

Starting with the 2017–18 award year, the pre-printed FAFSA<sup>®</sup> will no longer be available. The pre-printed FAFSA is the booklet version of the FAFSA. The PDF FAFSA will still be available for download across multiple Federal Student Aid websites (e.g., [fafsa.gov](http://fafsa.gov), [StudentAid.gov/resources](http://StudentAid.gov/resources), and [FinancialAidToolkit.ed.gov/resources](http://FinancialAidToolkit.ed.gov/resources)). Students will be able to obtain paper copies of the PDF FAFSA (which can be completed manually) from [www.edpubs.gov](http://www.edpubs.gov). Students may request up to three copies of the paper FAFSA and should receive their FAFSAs in three to seven business days after ordering.

### **Remind Students to Create FSA IDs**

Students who have not recently accessed [fafsa.gov](http://fafsa.gov) or other Federal Student Aid sites that require logging in may not have created an FSA ID yet. Please ask them to visit [StudentAid.gov/fsaid](http://StudentAid.gov/fsaid) to learn about and create an FSA ID. Reminder: A student with a PIN can input his or her PIN when creating an FSA ID. Linking the PIN to the FSA ID eliminates the need for the student's information to be sent to the Social Security Administration (since the SSA will already have validated the information when the student applied for the PIN) and allows the student to use the FSA ID immediately for all purposes, including signing a Renewal FAFSA or a Master Promissory Note.
